I. Call to Order / Introductions

Chair Solomon called the meeting to order at 3:05 p.m. Chair Solomon asked those present to introduce themselves which they then did.

II. Public Comment

There was no one signed up for Public Comment.

III. July 26, 2019 Minutes

Mr. Solomon asked for any additions, corrections, or deletions to the July 26, 2019 minutes.

ACTION: Ms. Gaffney moved, seconded by Mr. English, to approve the July 26, 2019 minutes. The motion passed unanimously.

IV. Intra-System Communication

Lane County Sheriff's Office

Mr. Riley said the Lane County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) was continuing to actively hire new people, and he also said there were quite a few LCSO personnel retiring. Mr. Riley said the LCSO was committed to continuing to work with Lane County Behavioral Health and other local partners to address the mental health crisis.

Youth Services Division

Ms. Frener announced her office was continuing its work with community partners on setting up a temporary homeless shelter in one of the pods.

Lane County District Attorney

Ms. Perlow announced a new attorney would be starting work in her office effective October 1, 2019; she also offered her office had recently hired a new paralegal. Finally, Ms. Perlow said her office would be reverting to 1990s methods for how her office would be handling civil commitments.

City of Florence

Ms. Reynolds said the City of Florence Public Safety was actively hiring; she mentioned the Florence Police Department had not been fully staffed for at least the last four years. She offered that Florence had been solid at recruitment, but there were some retention issues.

Lane County Administration

Mr. Rikhoff offered County Administration would be going in front of the Lane County Board of Com-

missioners on September 24, to share polling results from the failed Lane County Courthouse ballot measure. He said they planned to discuss the future of the efforts to fund a new Lane County Courthouse. Mr. Rikhoff announced the County's offer of a new home for Lane County Parole and Probation had been accepted, and there would be more information on that forthcoming. Finally, he announced an upcoming presentation on earthquakes given by Lucy Jones; he said the presentation would take place in Harris Hall from 8:30 a.m. to noon on October 11, 2019.

Oregon State Police

Mr. Martin said that Oregon State Police (OSP) was on the low end of the per-capita rating spectrum nationally, with regards to Troopers per 100,000 residents. He offered that during the last legislative session, OSP had pushed a ten-year plan that would highlight OSP's need to up their per-capita numbers. Mr. Martin said there were, on average, approximately 7-8 State Troopers per 100,000 Oregon residents. He announced that, although recent legislation aimed at upping OSP's per-capita numbers to roughly 15 Troopers per 100,000 residents had not passed, OSP had been granted an extra \$82 million in the biennial budget, and authorization to fill vacancies OSP had previously been holding open.

Oregon Youth Authority

Mr. Jones announced that Oregon Youth Authority was fully staffed, and their caseloads remained low. He said that OYA currently had four transition P.O.s statewide, and they were planning on hiring two more.

Springfield Police Department

Mr. Boring offered that local law enforcement hiring was always daunting. He said SPD had a presence at the Mayor's Emergency Summit, and that SPD was in the planning stages of upcoming emergency management trials.

Health & Human Services – Mental Health

Ms. Gaffney announced her office had recently hired an Assistant Director, and they were launching a recruitment for Youth Services Manager. She said Assisted Outpatient Treatment had been a salient talking point at the recent Mental Health Summit, and that CCO (Coordinated Care Organization) 2.0 was ongoing, with full implementation expected in January 2020. Ms. Gaffney said the SIM (Sequential Intercept Model) update for the Crisis Center was scheduled for October 14, 2019. Finally, she announced groundbreaking on MLK Commons was slated to begin in early November 2019.

Health & Human Services – Public Health

Ms. Warren reported the Mind Your Mind Conference was coming up the following week. She also said work was taking place putting together a Board of County Commissioners agenda packet for a workplan centering around youth marijuana use prevention in Lane County. Finally, Ms. Warren said her office was working on putting together rural emergency preparedness meetings.

Lane County Parole & Probation

Mr. Dumire announced that Lane County Parole and Probation was fully staffed for the first time in approximately six years. He said there were five people at the academy who were set to graduate on September 27, 2019, and there were currently nine people in training. Finally, Mr. Dumire said his office had recently added a full-time officer to Treatment Court.

Lane County Public Defender

Mr. Reinhard said his office was down eight attorneys for the year, and currently, there were three vacancies. He said no public defenders in the state yet had an official contract with the State of Oregon.

Chair Solomon asked if there was a push in the legislative short session to revisit the public defender con-

tracts with the state.

Mr. Reinhard said there was, but he did not think it realistic to expect the issue to be resolved in the short session.

Victim Services

Ms. Stewart announced that, in conjunction with the Lane County D.A.'s office, her office had recently trained almost 100 school administrators across Lane County on responding to child sexual abuse disclosures in schools. She said her office was set to move to its new location most likely before the end of November 2019. Ms. Stewart also announced that Womenspace was preparing for Domestic Violence Awareness Month coming up in October.

Citizen Member

Mr. English announced that summer Bible camp was officially over, and they were planning for annual conventions which would begin in the next two months. He said they were working on a workplace program for Kindness.

Reentry Services – Chair

Chair Solomon said that, unfortunately, Sponsors was also dealing with its own hiring challenges. He announced Sponsors had recently opened up a new house with five units of permanent supporting housing, and the Tiny House Project was well underway. Chair Solomon said the Justice Reinvestment/Behavioral Health Bill had passed, and there was a new PSCC Workgroup being convened soon to talk about priorities for the funding which was part of the legislation. Finally, Chair Solomon recognized Danielle Hansen for her service to the Lane County Drug Court; he said Ms. Hansen had recently taken a job with the State.

Lane County Board of Commissioners – Vice Chair

Commissioner Bozievich said the Lane County Board of Commissioners was set to revisit the new Lane County Courthouse discussion. He also said the Board was beginning to talk about short legislative session strategies for the Community Corrections Act.

V. Committee Reports

A. Budget Committee

1. Justice Reinvestment Grant Program Performance Measure Update

Chair Solomon offered the PSCC an update and Power Point presentation on the Justice Reinvestment Grant Program Performance Measures.

Mr. Dumire said the investments into housing had been very important to the numbers in the update.

Chair Solomon announced roughly 78% of short-term transitional leave and releases were going to Sponsors.

B. Behavioral Health & Criminal Justice Workgroup

No report.

C. Juvenile Committee

Ms. Frener offered the PSCC a Juvenile Committee report.

She said Harry Skinner, who was overseeing Public Safety for school district 4J, had given a presentation at the last Juvenile Committee meeting about the Salem-Keizer Threat Assessment. Ms. Frener said it would be great if Mr. Skinner would come and give that presentation to the PSCC.

D. Reentry Taskforce

No report.

E. Workplan Workgroup

No report.

VI. Public Safety Program Highlight: Parole & Probation Relocation

Mr. Rikhoff offered the PSCC a presentation on Lane County Parole and Probation's relocation. He reported the relocation would take place in roughly two years.

Mr. Dumire offered the relocation was a very collaborative, transparent process between Parole and Probation and Lane County, and his office felt good about how the relocation was going so far.

Chair Solomon asked if there was room for growth with the relocation.

Mr. Rikhoff answered there was considerable room for expansion.

Commissioner Bozievich wondered why there were no recidivism rates in the relocation presentation, especially considering Lane County was performing above state averages in this area.

Chair Solomon offered recidivism rates were in the original presentation, but had been edited out.

Mr. Rikhoff assured the PSCC that progress reports would be ongoing as the Parole and Probation relocation continued to unfold.

VII. 416 Randomized Control Trial Preliminary Results

Dr. McCart offered the PSCC a report and Power Point presentation on the preliminary results of the 416 Randomized Control Trial.

Chair Solomon thought it worth mentioning that as the Randomized Control Trial (RCT) ends, there is no further need to randomize participants. He said now that the RCT is over, this service would be available to anyone who qualifies for it.

Mr. McCart said the preliminary RCT analysis had been updated due to concerns expressed by Marion County. The second analysis produced very similar numbers to the preliminary one. He said there were corrections made after the first analysis in an attempt to alleviate Marion County's grievances.

Mr. Jones wondered if revocation numbers in the RCT data were broken down into types.

Mr. McCart replied they had that data, but the data had not been summarized to that level yet.

Chair Solomon asked about the sample size for the people in the RCT who had met the three-year threshold.

Mr. McCart answered there were 240 individuals in the RCT, but it was not just those individuals who had met the three-year threshold.

Ms. Frener left the meeting at 4:31 p.m.

Chair Solomon suggested adding the 416 RCT into the next Workplan Workgroup meeting.

Chair Solomon asked Mr. McCart if he had any conversations with the CJC about the 416 RCT.

Mr. McCart said he had, and CJC did have the RCT data analysis.

VIII. Grant Update

Ms. Sowards offered the PSCC a grant update.

Ms. Gaffney left the meeting at 4:39 p.m.

Chair Solomon offered the Washington D.C 9th Circuit Court of Appeals had recently reversed a Trump administration decision to withhold certain grant funding from Oregon because it was a Sanctuary State.

Mr. Rikhoff left the meeting at 4:56 p.m.
